

Where to Turn in Nashville – Based in Nashville, TN



Definition of Systems Coordination

Systems coordination: The strategic engagement of public health and healthcare delivery systems across levels of influence, grounded in the evidencebase, to support the collaboration and implementation of systems change by sharing best practices and resources aimed at improving health outcomes

Increasing Level of Community Involvement, Impact, Trust, and Communication Flow

Outreach

Consult

Involve

Shared Leadership

Some Community Involvement

Communication flows from one to the other, to inform

Provides community with information.

Entities coexist.

Outcomes: Optimally, establishes communication channels and channels for outreach.

More Community Involvement

Communication flows to the community and then back, answer seeking

Gets information or feedback from the community.

Entities share information.

Outcomes: Develops connections. Better Community Involvement

Communication flows both ways, participatory form of communication

Involves more participation with community on issues.

Entities cooperate with each other.

Outcomes: Visibility of partnership established with increased cooperation. Community Involvement

Collaborate

Communication flow is bidirectional

Forms partnerships with community on each aspect of project from development to solution.

Entities form bidirectional communication channels.

Outcomes: Partnership building, trust building.

Strong Bidirectional Relationship

Final decision making is at community level.

Entities have formed strong partnership structures.

Outcomes: Broader health outcomes affecting broader community. Strong bidirectional trust built.
