# Closing Plenary Session: Leveraging Public Health Systems to Meet the Needs of People Aging with HIV

More than half of all people with diagnosed HIV infection in the United States are 50 years of age or older, with approximately 1 in 5 of all people living with HIV over the age of 60. The unique and often complex clinical and pharmacological needs associated with HIV and aging, combined with the social and structural challenges that older people with HIV face, necessitate not only innovative approaches to comprehensive medical and support service delivery, but also coordination with complex payor systems in a dynamic healthcare environment. This plenary session will feature key public health system considerations for people aging with HIV, including important opportunities for trauma-informed, multi-disciplinary care and support via the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program.
