<sup>2</sup> The Infectious Disease Elimination Initiative was proposed in the President's FY19 Budget Request and included in the House bill. This new initiative will fund efforts to eliminate new infections such as HIV, hepatitis B, hepatitis C, STDs, and TB in areas of high-risk, including those with high rates of opioid-related transmission.

<sup>3</sup> The Senate has proposed a new initiative targeting infectious disease consequences of the opioid epidemic through expanded surveillance, treatment and education efforts for HIV, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C. Money would target areas at high-risk of HIV and hepatitis outbreaks due to injection drug use.

<sup>4</sup> The Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018 authorized mandatory funding for Community Health Centers. These numbers include discretionary appropriations as well as the mandatory funding of \$3.6 b for FY2017, \$3.8 b for FY2018, and \$4 b for FY2019. The President's FY2019 Budget proposed shifting \$3.6 b from mandatory to discretionary funding.

<sup>6</sup> This reflects the budget authority amounts and does not include the coalition's request for \$6.8 million in PHSA evaluation transfer authority.

<sup>7</sup> The President's Request reflects \$3.54 b in Program Level funding for SAMHSA, plus an additional \$1.24 b for new opioid related programs, which do not have comparisons to previous fiscal years.

<sup>8</sup> Reducing Injection Drug Use, HIV/AIDS, and Hepatitis is a new program proposed in the President's FY2019 Budget, and does not have prior fiscal year comparisons.
